As Curator of Logan Botanic Garden in South West Scotland Richard has travelled extensively on plant exploration trips to Chile, Turkey, China, The Canaries, USA, Spain and Vietnam.

Logan has recently featured on Gardener's World and Radio 4's GQT.

Neil Porteous

Neil is Head of Gardens at Mount Stewart, Co. Down and Regional Gardens & Parks Advisor, NI for the National Trust. A Scot, Neil moved to Ireland in 2007 to Ballynatray in Co. Waterford. Prior to that, he was Head Gardener at Clumber Park, Nottinghamshire. He trained at the Royal Botanic Gardens Edinburgh and has a BSc. Hons from Greenwich in Horticulture and an MA in Garden History from Bristol.

Title of talk: "Travels in N.E. India for Mount Stewart' also will discuss Edith and Frank Kingdon-Ward relating the plants to our coastal Irish conditions.

Neil Armstrong

Born Enniskillen, studied medicine in Trinity College Dublin, moved to Cornwall in 1987.

For the past 20 years he has created from scratch a 22 acre sub-tropical garden, Tremenheere Sculpture Garden in Penzance, which is now established in the great gardens of Cornwall group.

He's been on botanical field trips to Mexico, South Africa, Northern Vietnam, Northern Thailand, California, Greece, La Palma, La Gomera and Tenerife, Spain, France and Portugal.
